CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Modern college, Imphal, is permanently affiliated to Manipur University, Canchipur and follows the curriculum prescribed by the University. The college ensures effective curricular delivery through a well-planned and documented process. The IQAC prepares the academic calendar of the college and also the concerned departments prepare their departmental academic calendars prior to the commencement of every academic calendar. The academic calendar specifies suitable available dates for significant academic and other activities. The faculty members are briefed on the academic activities of the college on the first meeting held before the commencement of classes for every academic year. The HODs arrange departmental meetings to distribute and assign the workload. Considering the workload and planning held in the departmental meetings the syllabus is disseminated as per classes and papers/ courses for teaching. Teachers conduct classes according to the general time table prepared by the college prior to the commencement of the classes. Faculty members prepare semester wise teaching plan for theory & practical at the beginning of every

semester. Along with the prescribed syllabus by Manipur University, the teacher concerned prepare their lectures with the latest information available from the e-resources and other sources that complements in explaining the topics.

Departmental meetings are held periodically to review the progress and completion of the syllabus. For the effective delivery of curricula, dept.

integrate classroom teaching with various ICT tools, lab. Practical's, student's seminars, tutorials, field trip etc. For the upgradation of subject related knowledge, the college organizes seminars, workshops, Unit tests, etc.

These activities provide a platform to the faculty and the students to participate and interact with experts in various fields and update their subject knowledge. Faculties effectively and creatively use PPTS and other ICT tools in making their lecture more interesting and interactive. College also provides special guidance to the slow learners through the tutorial classes and also provide study materials to the students. At the same time, IQAC monitors the progress and the completion of the syllabus by organizing joint meeting with the HODs of different departments. The IQAC monitors the overall teaching and learning process by collecting the student's feedback at the end of every academic year. The feedback obtained from the students are analyzed and the report is communicated to the concerned depts. Faculty members of the college are encouraged to attend invitation programs, refresher courses, seminars, workshops, conferences to update their knowledge. IQAC mentors the progress and completion of the syllabus by organizing joint meeting with the HODs of different department.

Feedback Obtained
<p>Internal Quality Assurance Cell, Modern College distributed feedback forms to the students of the college covering the following three different criteria i. Course and Infrastructure. ii. Teaching, Learning Process. iii. Curriculum. The questionnaires were collected from the respondents and analyzed by three members of the IQAC, Modern college. The summary of the analysis of the feedback according to the three criteria is given below: 1. Course and Infrastructure: 15 of the respondent strongly agree, 60 of the respondents agree, 10 gave neutral response and 15 of the respondents disagree. 2. Teaching, Learning Process: 37.8 of the respondents accepted it to be thorough, 35.8 of the respondents found it to be satisfactory, 17.6 of the respondents said its fair and 9.3 of the respondents said its indifferent. 3. Curriculum: 16.4 of the respondents strongly agree, 60.3 of the respondents agree, 21.3 of the respondents are neutral and 2 of the respondents disagree. The analysis of the feedback was discussed minutely about the findings. Most of the students have responded satisfactorily in all the criteria. From the findings the college needs to maintain and work for bringing up the quality.</p>

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The performance of the students is evaluated by the teachers throughout the session for improvement and quality of the students. Our college being affiliated college, we have to follow mechanism prescribed by Manipur University. However affiliated colleges are given some flexibility to determine internal assessments. Recently Manipur University has introduced internal assessments which will be part of end semester exam. The weight age of marks varies of different departments but as for arts department it is 30. We feel that continuous evaluation and assessments of the students is an integral part of teaching-learning process which also acts as feedback to the teachers about the understanding level of the students. For this we have constituted Academic committee and Examination committee through which various methods are used for internal assessments of our college. Some of the assessment patterns are as follows: 1. Unit Test: Unit tests are conducted for each paper every semester. 2. Home assignment: Home assignment is one of the methods often used use by our college particularly during holiday, bandhs, strike, during unavoidable circumstances, etc. In unit test and home assignment sometimes, teacher concerned give comments of their answer script and show it to the students so that they know their mistakes and learn to improve. 3. Departmental Seminars: It is another mechanism for internal assessment of the students of the college. Every semester each department organizes departmental seminar. The students present their paper from their syllabus and based on their performance it is evaluated and graded for award. Modern college is affiliated to Manipur University. Therefore, we followed the mechanism of internal assessments as per directive of M.U. After completion of admission and before the beginning of new session Induction programme for first semester (New students) are organized every year and in the programme different rules and regulations including internal and external examination system are well informed. As responsible

persons we follow the principle of confidentiality, transparency and fairness of examination and evaluation. We formed Examination committee and Academic committee and along with some senior teacher frisking physically is done during examination to avoid using unfair means. This is also a kind of deterrence shown to the students that we are against such unmoral practice. In case of complain or grievances in the internal examination within the college the teacher concerned try to rectify and solve the grievances as per genuineness of the students' complain. If it cannot be solved alone it is referred to the H.O.D. or higher authority of the institution for necessary justice to the problem. Grievances regarding university examination, student may directly apply to the concern authority of the University for Re-evaluation or rechecking etc of their grievances. The entire mechanism to deal examination related grievances is time bound as per university rule and regulations. Hence their grievances can be addressed in time.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Every academic calendar year, our institution comes up with the various academic related information before the commencement of the academic year by Academic committee. The academic calendar for every academic year is prepared according to the schedule of the Manipur University as our institution is affiliated to the said university. The detailed layout of the academic plan of the semester, examination, extra-curricular activities, departmental activities etc. are displayed both on the college website and notice board of the college to make sure every student are well informed. According to the need, teachers also pass important information to students through social medias such as WhatsApp. The institution also informs the students through local newspapers of certain important information such as the date for filling up examination forms and admission dates. The examination for each semester is conducted according to the schedule set by the Manipur University, the affiliated university. These includes the various unit tests conducted by department concerned after completing their respective units. Students are also given assignments which are arranged by the respective department. Students are given particular seminar topic to present. Every teacher makes sure that they covered their syllabus on time and also give remedial classes according to the need of the students. At the end of the semester class, teachers revise their syllabus according to the needs and requirements of the students.

The institute has a variety of infrastructures to facilitate administration, games sports apart from learning and teaching activities. The administrative block houses Principals office, IQAC office, Account section, Computer room and Examination section. There are altogether 14 departments each with classroom and staff room for teaching-learning process. Science blocks are mostly attached with laboratory which need further upgradation with modern facilities. Besides departmental classrooms, there are common classrooms and audio-visual hall to conduct seminar and classes. There is also a broad band leased of 8 MBPS to facilitate accounting process in the college. the college has a central computer lab where the students and teachers can freely access internet whenever they need. This lab is kept open during the college hours so that the students can use the computers during their free time. As a part of overall human resource development, the college has a well maintained swimming pool, a volleyball court and a gymnasium hall. They serve the purpose of venting out youthful rage and energy of the students in a positive outlet through games and sports thereby maintaining physical health and discipline which is necessary to host a sound mind. Besides the college staff, community nearby are also welcomed to avail the facilities in the swimming pool by charging nominal fees and state Level tournaments are also held at regular intervals .The college campus consists of mini-botanical garden with some medicinal plants which is beneficial to the students. Eco-club garden near the college canteen, and eco-park in front of the administrative block adds to ecological benefits. There are two hostels under the supervision of a warden namely Old Boys Hostel and New Boys Hostel each with accommodation of 40 students. Student centric infrastructure such as Modern college Students' Union, Boys' common room Girls' common room are available. The college has NSS cell comprising of two units- I (100 boys) II (100 girls) to extend social services to the surrounding communities NCC Unit (Sr. Div) with a total of 80 cadets both boys and girls under 14 Manipur Bn. NCC Imphal. The college has a two-wheeler parking shed a Car parking shed to accommodate vehicles of students staff of the college. The college has a library committee with the principal as the ex-officio chairman. The committee oversees the infrastructure, maintenance and proper functioning of the library. Photo copying facility is available in the college library at the Administrative block at nominal rates. The college has a well-stocked library which is partially automated with SOUL software 2.0 network version. The Modern College has a collection of text books, reference books and subscription of journals and newspapers. College canteen is another service crucial for refreshing and relaxing both for students and staffs.

The college focuses on decentralisation by giving equal role to all stakeholders in the functioning of the institution. The planning and development committee is the apex body which monitors the overall development of the college. The committee takes care of financial management and implementation of policies which leads to upgradation of the academic and physical infrastructure. It guides and articulates the available resources and provides free hand to the head of the institution to carry out the activities to reach the expected maximum standard. Some of the selected swimmers who were trained here represent the

state in the national aquatic championships in different tournaments and bagged medals as well. The college swimming pool has been hosting various state level competitions and tournaments for defense personnel such as CRPF, BSF etc. Two interactive white boards are installed with funding from RUSA.

Research and Development

Modern College could not give precedence to research activities being an undergraduate educational institute. There are few departments particularly Zoology and Botany departments take up extensive research work both on major or minor projects under the funding of central agencies. The faculties are engaged in academic and extra co-curricular activities and extension services as well. As such, giving eminence to research activities on a regular basis could not be carried out by the faculties. The College has a Research Committee that encourages the teaching fraternity to take up research work and extend help to the concerned faculties in applying major and minor research proposals. There are also some faculties who are engaged in research activities taking up minor/major project works. Some senior faculties are supervising some M.Phil. or PhD research scholar while some faculties are pursuing PhD in different field of studies. For the development of the institute, the college has Planning and Development Committee who consistently come up with innovative ideas to keep up with the latest development in the educational areas. The committee encourages the faculties to get engage in research activities and also to organise seminars, workshops, conferences and symposia to enhance their teaching abilities.

Examination and Evaluation

The college being affiliated to Manipur University has three years B.A and B.Sc. Programme under Semester system. Modern college being one of the University centre, arrange and organize the examinations as per University rules and regulations. Internal assessments are conducted by the different departments of the college for the continuous evaluation of the students. Besides assessment, the students are assigned one topic each to

present in the seminar conducted department wise for better understanding of what they have been taught. The internal assessments are evaluated by the concerned faculties in all the departments and the marks obtained by the students were credited along with the marks obtained from the external examination conducted by the University. The answer scripts of the University examination are submitted to the University for central evaluation. Some senior faculties of the college participate in the central evaluation of the University. In order to improve the teaching qualities of the faculties, on a regular basis, the college evaluated the performances of the faculties by taking feedbacks from the students. As part of the college evaluation a well planning, development, implementation, and action and improvement were critically examines which provides feedbacks to teachers and learners about their learning capability.

Teaching and Learning

In the college, the IQAC focuses on the improvement of the continuous teaching-learning process. To discuss on how to improve the teaching-learning process qualitatively, meetings are held from time to time with the Principal in the Chair. The faculties of the college do their best to create a democratic classroom atmosphere for the students to have open discussions and make the teaching-learning process more students cantered. The students are encouraged to actively participate in interaction during the classes by the faculties. The faculties organized classroom seminars on different topics or issues so that the students are given privileges to participate in order to express or share their opinion freely. And this kind of platform gives the student the opportunity to develop their interactive skills in learning which help them to learn effectively in this collaborative way. Departmental wise there are tutorial and remedial classes for imparting extra knowledge to the sound students and for helping the weak student to improve in their learning. To provides wider scope for innovative learning, each student are given tasks to find more study materials / information from library

books, journals, magazine and also from internet surfing. The faculties take charge in considering the learning needs and form specific learning objectives. And they implement plan of work and evaluates the outcomes and carried out strategies in identification of topic and questions. The faculties created a conducive learning environment in which the learners were the key participants and it can be said that in the teaching-learning processes the learners and teachers are equally involved. To adopt effective learning outcome, there are also activities like content focus, critical thinking, problem solving etc. There are exchange of feedbacks between the teachers and learners in order to help in comprehending the area that needed an improvement.

Curriculum Development

The college being affiliated to Manipur University, Curriculum development is the prerogative. And the college strictly follows the regulations of the Manipur University that prescribe curricula and syllabi of courses run by the affiliated college of the state. From time to time, some faculties belonging to various departments of the college have been appointed to take part in the process of curriculum construction, development framing of the syllabi of the Manipur University.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

First Best Practice: 1. Title of the Practice – “Moulding better citizens” 2. Goal: The College has been promoting higher education in Science, Humanities and Social Sciences for the last five decades in Imphal East District. The need of the hour is not merely promoting higher education but also to provide a stepping stone for individuals who would adjust and contribute to the society. Now the number of individuals with University diploma/degree is on the rise. These educated young students may have become successful being employed or able to pave themselves a path leading to wealth. And they may have earned respectful reputation too, in the profession they chose, but majority of them turns out to be lacking good human quality. And this is a sad trend while the society needs individuals who can adjust and contribute to the society. The College aims to mould individuals who would cater to the needs of the society.

3. The Context: The present curriculum serves only to produce degree holders and the main aims of education to bring about an all round development of holistic approach are not clearly reflected from it. Believing in the flexibility of the curriculum, the teachers of the College decide to transact the curricular and co-curricular activities with a humane touch so that the college keeps moulding individuals with good human qualities and not merely with University degrees. Translating the above idea into the reality is indeed very difficult. The Volume of content in the syllabus are huge and the available time is too little taking into account of the innumerable strikes, bandhs and blockades in Manipur. The only means left is the optimum utilization of the available teaching time followed along with the challenging issues to plan, implement and to carry out systematically so as to fulfil both the classroom teaching-learning process and also give relevance to real life happenings and for the future too. 4. The Practice: In the beginning of every session, the departmental heads discuss with their teaching and non-teaching staffs about the distribution of workloads and to proceed on with the teaching-learning process, encouraging the students to stay fit mentally, physically,

morally and spiritually along with different platform of interactions. As such, the teacher provides situations for student-student and student-teacher interactions. When the unit is completed, the teacher actfully relates what the students have learnt in the class with day-to-day life and also discusses the impact to the society. The teacher then asks the students to surf the internet to collect more information/ knowledge. When enough time is at hand, the teacher initiates for a classroom seminar/discussion to widen the scope of the learning through sharing and transfer of learning. This step in the teaching-learning is taken up with the conviction of bringing out the latest qualities in the students and also to make them sense the applicability of the lessons. This also makes the students realize what the society needs and also of their role towards the environment. Having understood the utmost requirement for the students involvement in the social-related issues just to be complete human beings, the College organizes co-curricular activities pertaining to the safety of the environment while transacting the curriculum side by side. In this context, it is worthy to mention that the College intends to create a green zone within the campus which is located in a semi-urban area where construction of concrete buildings is very much on the rise. The buildings of the college are in the midst of green pastures surrounded by polluted water bodies. Steps have been taken up to maintain the green lawns that serve as play fields for the students and local youths as well. There are few ponds for water storage in different corners of the campus from where water is being collected for several uses. During the NSS camps, under the guidance of teachers, the students of the College clean up the ponds, gardens, water bodies, lawns and the surroundings of the College and they also plant trees in and around the campus. Staff and students of the College planted 150 saplings in the campus while celebrating "VANMAHOTSAV, 2012" in the Modern College campus. The celebration has been unique and it has been a proud moment and privilege for the Modern College to have been chosen as the only venue in the entire State for observing the above said event. Besides the above activities, the College students have been taking part in NSS camps, venturing to different communities to take up community cleaning programmes, etc. These programmes provide opportunities to the students for interactions with people with different cultural/religious backgrounds and these also provide the young students with a better insight of the social problems. Through these curricular and co-curricular adventures spanning over a period of three years, the students are prepared to contribute to the society while conveniently adjusting to it.

5. Evidence of Success: Success is a big term. Successfully moulding students from different localities with different backgrounds to become individuals with complete human qualities besides becoming graduates in a span of three years is indeed a Himalayan task. And finding the evidence of transformation of individuals is all the more difficult. The College does not have a mechanism to detect the change taking place in the personality/mentality of the individual students. But the teachers decide the observation of the students from a closer perspective is the only means to note the transformation, if any, within them. Since the taking up of the mission seriously, the teachers observe the atmosphere, group dynamics and the outward manifestation of the nature/character of the individual students while organizing NSS, Blood Donation, Community service programmes, etc. Of course, participation of the students in the said programmes a few years back was still there. But now, it is a joy to watch our students seriously involved in the humanitarian causes. Earlier fewer students turned up for donating blood in the Blood donation camps but encouragingly, more number of students volunteered for the same in the recent blood donation camps. And now many students, both boys and girls, volunteer to take part in social-related programmes. And it is satisfying to observe that more and more students apply for joining the NCC and many of them are trying for Defense services to serve the people and the nation as well. The observable manifestations in the general character of our students apparently indicate the partial success of the

College in moulding individuals capable of catering to the needs of the society. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The College which is a co-educational institute is situated in a semi-urban area surrounded by people with different cultural and religious backgrounds. As would have been expected, students from all religious backgrounds are admitted to the College every year. And it is not at all easy to organise activities in the College as the students have different beliefs as influenced by divergent cultural and religious background. While the ground reality of insufficient time available for the organization of curricular and co-curricular activities looms high, the unsettling atmosphere of the state of Manipur tarnished by violence, road blockade and bandhs provides demoralizing hindrances to the chalked-out programmes of the College. But it takes the undeterred efforts and spirit of the College system trying to materialize the laid out objectives. The College, being a government institute, is funded by the state government for smooth functioning and carrying out the curricular and co-curricular programmes. But the fund earmarked for the said activities is meagre. Though the teachers feel that widening the scope of the desired programmes with more funding would pay in terms of moulding up young students for their effective role in the society, helplessness lingers due to the paucity of fund.

Second Best Practice:

1. Title of the Practice: "Eco-development Programme"
2. Goal: The Modern College Environmental Club has been set up in April, 2012 with a hope to create a sound environment in and around the College campus. The club focuses on achieving the following goals:
 1. To give awareness of environmental issues to the staff and students of the College and also to the people residing around the campus.
 2. To establish a Green Zone in the Modern College campus and in the surrounding areas.
 3. To conduct seminars, lecture programmes, group discussions etc. on environmental related issues.
 4. To plant rare and medicinal plants inside the College campus.
 5. To make the College campus a solid waste free zone.
 6. To harvest rain water.
3. Context: Forests are home to a wide range of flora and fauna biodiversities. But, the forests of Manipur have reached a critical stage of ecological degradation due to the increase in anthropogenic activities. The clearance of vast areas in the hills due to the practice of shifting cultivation and over exploitation of the forest produces remain the main reasons for forest degradation. The Modern College situated at Imphal East District happens to be one of the oldest Colleges of Manipur. The College
